Diploma Policy

Accreditation standards or principles guiding graduation standards

Based on its educational philosophy and education-related areas of research, the Master's course at the Kagawa University Graduate School of Education provides advanced training and education in the field of child development. Students will develop teaching skills that will allow them to create an engaging classroom environment that will foster mutual respect and encourage the pursuit of learning.

The criteria for successful completion of a Master's in Education are as follows:

1. Expertise in the field of specialization

In addition to acquiring advanced expertise on the field of child growth and development, and advanced educational sciences, students will develop an extensive knowledge in their area of focus that will allow them to develop their expertise as highly specialized professionals.

2. Problem-solving and information-gathering skills

In their fields of specialization, students will have the ability to plan and carry out research and to disseminate and discuss the results.

By utilizing expert knowledge and sophisticated practical leadership skills, teachers will support the development and growth of school students to ensure that formal and informal learning will serve as a means to secure a commitment towards social justice, personal growth, and active citizenship.

3. Ethical and social responsibility

We aim to train teaching professionals who are aware of their social and ethical responsibilities towards the care and development of children, and who will engage in research and further training.

We aim to develop teaching professionals who: - respect the traditions and culture of Japan while also respecting the traditions and cultures of other countries - have a good understanding and appreciation of our modern globalized society - can contribute to the peace and development of the international community.
